Wax pot (scalds and burns – used for candle making, perfume cones, cresset lamps and wax tablets)	5	3	Romans, Greeks, Egyptians, Vikings, Saxons, Castles, Great Fire of London, Tudors, Tudor Christmas	All	Wax pot is to be placed on table with electrical cable tucked behind the table edge against the wall – i.e., no trailing wires. OTP teacher to place warning signs on the table. Fire Blanket to be placed next to the pot. Heat to approx 60 degrees. Close adult supervision required. Activity to be run by teacher / TA, i.e. not a parent helper. Maximum of 10 pupils, only approaching the wax pot one at a time. OTP teacher to provide instruction and safety briefing and follow up to ensure this is being followed correctly – e.g. minimal wax drips on clay dishes. If safety requirements are not being followed, OTP leader will stop the activity. OTP teacher to train school staff member including attaching the wick, dipping into pot, drips into pot (not the dish or the table), removing the non-dripping wick over clay dish. OTP teacher to ensure all pupils only complete the activity with a staff member present.	15 MEDIUM
					OTP teacher to ensure the wax pot id not left unsupervised, eg during break - cover the pot and ask an adult to keep guard! OTP teacher to supervise the movement of the hot wax pot after the activity is complete.

OTP teacher will have been trained in the safe handling of materials. OTP teacher will wear heat resistant apron, gloves and eye safety goggles. Fire blanket for emergency use. Students are to remain at least 4m back at all times before and after the activity; clear instructions will be provided to ensure students stay safe. Clay mould to be hand tested for dryness before use. Bowl of water used for cooling of ladle and pewter mould. OTP leader to ensure that pewter has set before placing it in the water to cool to avoid metal splatters. Gas cylinders to be stored separately from gas cooker with the red lid securely fastened. 



Risk ratings are calculated by considering the likelihood of an event occurring along with the severity of the potential consequence should an accident occur. After considering existing control measures, values are assigned to the likelihood and severity from the scales below and these figures multiplied to establish the risk rating.





What do your risk ratings mean?

- Risk is categorised as LOW: Look to reduce risk if practicable
- Risk has been categorised as MEDIUM: Begin to plan your action to reduce the risk immediately
- Risk has been categorised as HIGH: Immediate action required to reduce the risk
